The TTNC held its 5th Annual General Meeting on November 24, 2015 via a Skype teleconference. The fourteen in attendance represented all six Member Networks. All decisions were made by consensus. After the AGM, the board positions for 2015-2016 were decided.

News from the Committees:

Compassionate Presence: Covert Training Invites Subtle Energies Insights

"Healing is best accomplished when art and science are conjoined, when body and spirit are probed together. Only when doctors can brood for the fate of a fellow human afflicted with fear and pain do they engage the unique individuality of a particular human being...a doctor thereby gains courage to deal with the pervasive uncertainties for which technical skill alone is inadequate. Patient and doctor then enter into a partnership as equals.

I return to my central thesis. Our health care system is breaking down because the medical profession has been shifting its focus away from healing, which begins with listening to the patient. The reasons for this shift include a romance with mindless technology."

THE LOST ART OF HEALING: Practicing Compassion in Medicine (1999)

This article was requested by, and originally published in Subtle Energies Magazine, Volume 26, Issue 2. It is reprinted here by permission. The healer referred to is Dora Kunz, although he also incorporated some experiences working with other healers. Ed

I wanted to study with the healer and she instructed me to sit and observe, nothing more. She did not explain what she was doing, and provided no further instructions. Just The only observe. I did not understand. Yet, I continued to instruction observe because she knew something, she did something that seemed to be associated with the healer kept improvement and healing of many patients. A few giving me was common in spiritual healing and martial arts tradishowed remarkable improvement – at times it to observe. seemed miraculous. I felt drawn to understand. It was an unique opportunity and I was prepared to follow her guidance.

The healer was remarkable. When she put her hands on the patient, I could see the patient's defenses melt. At that moment, the patient seemed to feel safe, cared for, and totally nurtured. The patient felt accepted for just who she was and all the shame about the disease and past actions appeared to melt away. The healer continued to move her hands here and there and, every so often, she spoke to the client. Tears and slight sobbing erupted from the client. Then, the client became very peaceful and quiet. Eventually, the session was finished and the client expressed gratitude to the healer and reported that her lower back pain and the constriction around her heart had been released, as if a weight had been taken from her body.

How was this possible? I had so many questions to ask the healer: "What were you doing? What did you feel in your hands? What did you think? What did you say so softly to the client?"

Yet she did not help me understand how I could do this. The

only instruction the healer kept giving me was to observe. Yes, she did teach me to be aware of the energy fields around the person and taught me how I could practice therapeutic touch. But she was doing much more and I longed to understand more about the process.

Sitting at the foot of the healer, observing for months, I often felt frustrated as she continued to insist that I just observe. How could I ever learn from this healer if she did not explain what I should do! Does the learning occur by activating my mirror neurons? Similar instructions are tions - the guru or mentor usually tells an apprentice to observe and be there. But how can one gain healing skills or spiritual healing abilities if you are only allowed to observe the process? Shouldn't the healer be demonstrating actual practices and teaching skills?

After many sessions, I finally realized that the healer's instruction to observe the healing was no indirect instruction. I began to learn how to be present without judging, to be present with compassion, to be present with total awareness in all senses, and to be present without frustration. The many hours at the foot of this master were not just wasted time. It eventually became clear that those hours of observation were important training and screening strategies used to insure that only those students who were motivated enough to master the discipline of non-judgmental observation, the discipline to be present and open to any experience, would continue to participate in the training process. I finally understood. I was being taught a subtle energies skill of compassionate, mindful awareness. Once I, the apprentice, achieved this state, I was ready to begin work with clients and master technical aspects of the healing practice – but not before. Continued on next page

A major component of the healing skill that relies on subtle energies is the ability to be totally present with the client without judgment. To be peaceful, caring, and present seems to create an energetic ambiance that sets the stage, creates the space, for more subtle aspects of the healing interaction. This energetic ambiance is similar to feeling the love of a grandparent: feeling total acceptance from someone who just knows you are a remarkable human being. In the presence of a healer with such a compassionate presence, you feel safe, accepted, and engaged in a timeless state of mind, a state that promotes healing and regeneration as it dissolves long held defensiveness and fear-based habits of holding others at bay. This state of mind provides an opportunity for worries and unsettled emotions to dissipate. Feeling safe, accepted, and experiencing compassionate love supports the biological processes that nurture regeneration and growth.

How different this is from the more common experience with medical practitioners who have little time to listen and to be with a patient. We might experience a medical provider as someone who sees us only as an illness (the cancer patient, the asthma patient) instead of recognizing us as a human spirit who happens to have an illness. At times we can feel as though we are seen only as a series of numbers in a medical chart – yet we know we are more than that. People long

to be seen. Often the medical provider interrupts with unrelated questions instead of listening. It becomes clear that the computerized medical record is more important than the human being seated there. We can feel more fragmented, less safe, when we are not heard, not understood. The healing connection is often blocked, the absence of a human connection is so obvious. Often the medical provider is unaware of the effect of their rushed behavior and lack of presence. They can issue a diagnosis based on the scientific data without recognizing the emotional impact on the person receiving it.

What is missing is compassion and caring for the patient. Sitting at the foot of the master healer is not wasted time when the apprentice learns how to genuinely attend to another with non-judgmental, compassionate presence. However, this requires substantial personal work. Possibly all allied healthcare providers should be required, or at least invited, to learn how to attain the state of mind that can enhance healing. Perhaps the practice of medicine could change if, as Bernard Lown wrote, the focus were once again on healing, "...which begins with listening to the patient."

From Vision to Reality - The History of TTNC

At the 1997 TTNO Conference the idea of a national Therapeutic Touch® organization to be known as the "Canadian Therapeutic Touch Network" (CTTN) was presented to the representatives from the already established regional Networks. All in attendance agreed that there was support in their areas for such an endeavour. A quote from the minutes, "General consensus was that it should have representatives from all networks to reflect a national perspective".

Goals: the main issues to be considered:

- communication, connecting networks and people,
- standardization of curriculum and teaching standards,
- collect research and data
- be a source of information and support, and perhaps establish an internet space,
- list hospitals in Canada where Therapeutic Touch is available,
- provide information on how to start a network.
- CTTN.... "would become responsible for publication of the newsletter".
- Logo..."should be a maple leaf with hands to appear within this symbol".

Progress was slow as meetings were held only once a year at the TTNO Conference. The Steering Committee included Shirley McLaughlin (ATTN) as chair; Beverley Snaychuk (TTNA) as secretary, and Peter Andrewes (ATTN) as treasurer. It grappled with such issues as finance, a logo, individual statements for ethics, membership and a mission.

Peter Andrewes (ATTN) was instrumental in securing our Therapeutic Touch trademark designation; it has been viable since 2003. (It is now printed as Therapeutic Touch®)

In 2009, a volunteer board made up of representatives from the various Networks held the inaugural meeting via a teleconference call with Barbara Stone (ATTN) as chair. CTTN representatives were: Marion Cameron (TTNA) secretary, Linda Sampson (BCTTNS) treasurer. Members-atlarge: Irma Bubolic (TTNQ); Brita Ball (TTNO); Lil Smith (MTTN). Subsequent meetings were held every 2 months.

At the TTNO Conference on Nov. 7, 2010, Barbara Stone chaired the meeting of the CTTN – later to become known as TTNC. Goals were:

- to set up a website,
- each network to be assessed yearly at \$1.00 per member
- establish a logo with bilingual reference,
- set up Skype for teleconferencing.

In January 2011,TTNC became a corporation registered with the federal government and with a board comprised of 5 directors (now 6 representing all Member Networks), with a set of bylaws and the website www.ttnc.ca.

Its mission was to act as an umbrella organization for the Canadian Networks and be the National voice for Therapeutic Touch in Canada. Directors were

> Barbara Stone (ATTN) chair & treasurer; Marion Cameron (TTNA) secretary; Cheryl Larden (BCTTNS); Leo Gregory (TTNQ) webmaster; Brita Ball (TTNO).

Fast forward to 2015 . . . The TTNC Board holds monthly meetings via Skype teleconferencing; has a logo; mission, vision and values statements; policies for the officers of the board; bylaws; newsletter published quarterly (TTNC News); 3 brochures produced by the brochure committee (available on the website); National Curriculum for teaching Therapeutic Touch is in progress; to have Therapeutic Touch sessions covered by extended health is being earnestly pursued.

A Liability Insurance Policy for practitioners and teachers is available if you are a member of your Network.

In 2015, TTNC officially represented Canadian TTers at the Therapeutic Touch International Association (TTIA) Congress in Seattle, WA, USA.

The structure of TTNC resembles a federation in which the Canadian Networks are represented on the Board and consulted on major expenditures and other ventures.

All the achievements were made possible through the time and efforts of volunteers and financial support from the Member Networks. Kudos to all those that have supported the vision put forth 18 years ago.

- continue to champion the work of the TTNC committees and all volunteers.

QUANTUM THEORY

Is "spooky action at a distance" real? By Mei-fei Elrick

Research: Quantum Theory claims that objects separated by distance can affect each other's behavior. New research is looking at whether or not there is evidence to support this claim.

A recent study, conducted by B. Hanson, et al, entitled "Loophole-free Bell inequality violation using electron spins separated by 1.3 kilometers", published in Nature Vol. 526:7575 pp 682-686 October 29, 2015 has supported one of the most fundamental claims of quantum theory - that objects separated by great distance can instantaneously affect each other's behavior. "(NY Times Oct. 21, 2015 John Markoff: Sorry Einstein. Quantum Study Suggests 'Spooky Action' Is Real.)"

This finding is counter to Einstein's understanding of locality which states that "...an object is directly influenced only by its immediate surroundings". Einstein's thought was that a separate particle could not be 'entangled' so completely that measuring one particle would instantaneously influence the other, regardless of the distance separating them.

According to the NY Times, Einstein was 'unhappy' with the uncertainty introduced by quantum theory and described its implication as "akin to God's play dice".

Experiments conducted by physicists began to suggest that there were 'alternative explanations' that are referred to as loopholes that, until now, previously enabling particles even if separated by the width of the universe could instantly interact.

The most recent experiment which was published in *Nature* was described as a 'loophole-free Bell test' in a reference to an experiment proposed in 1964 by the physicist John Stewart Bell as a way of proving that 'spooky action at a Scientists at M.I.T. are considering conducting more distance' is real.

The researchers working in Delft were able to 'entangle two electrons separately at a distance of 1.3 kilometers...and then share information between them'. Physicists use the term 'entanglement' to refer to pairs of particles that are generating in such a way that they cannot be described independently.

A theoretical physicist, Leonard Susskind*, at Stanford is quoted as saying "What I find interesting is that the experimenters are learning how to manipulate quantum systems and do experiments that are far beyond

SPOTLIGHT ON TTNO's SANDRA DIXON

What would you do if you received an envelope from your MP – plain white envelope with no stamp? I suspect that many of us would do just as Sandra Dixon did. We'd put it aside as non-urgent... or even throw it out.

She did finally open the envelope to discover that she had been awarded the Government of Canada Volunteer Award for the Don Valley West constituency. There was also an invitation to an award luncheon that had already happened. In January however, she received a second envelope from her MP which she opened it immediately. A second chance allowed her to receive her medal, a framed citation and a Canadian flag at a luncheon on Flag Day in February. She was thrilled to receive these, and accepted on behalf of all palliative volunteers.

Sandra's journey into Therapeutic Touch® began 12 years ago shortly after the death of her husband. A friend, who did volunteer palliative care, gave her a Reiki session. That experience began Sandra's interest in volunteer hospice work and also her exploration into energy healing methods.

From among them, it was Therapeutic Touch that spoke to Sandra, but she felt that she didn't have time. She 'asked for a sign' and then she spotted a one inch ad in the local weekly newspaper, The Mirror: "Bayview Community Hospice needs volunteers". Sandra phoned immediately and although was met with concern that it had only been 6 months since her husband's death she was granted an interview and accepted as a volunteer. This required that she take the 30 hour volunteer training.

Although her 93 year old parents were still living with her, and in spite of all the 'buts' that might have prevented Sandra from studying Therapeutic Touch, she took Level 1 from Maria Rossiter-Thornton and Theresa Moore in 2004. That year, although her father died in September and her mother in November, Sandra continued with her commitment to hospice and Therapeutic Touch. She feels that Maria and Theresa are best teachers you could ever find!

When Sandra was nominated for the Volunteer Award, she had contributed 2500 hours with palliative patients in eleven years. The hospice provides in-home visits but Sandra also goes to the hospital when asked. She finds that she is always welcomed in hospitals.

Each year **April** is dedicated to **Care for the Caregiver**.

She remembers arriving to find her client in a coma. The woman's husband apologized for not letting her know NOT to come. Sandra did Therapeutic Touch anyway. The patient opened her eyes and said, "Oh, Sandra, you've come!" That patient remained alert until her death the next day.

Over that time, Sandra's been told many times "You must be special. I could never do that work. It would make me sad." She responds that she does it because she can see the difference she makes with these beautiful people who are palliative. She believes that you must put your own ego aside to do it, but also understands the importance of caring for yourself, especially by not taking their sadness home with you.

Anything Sandra gives she receives much more back. She is filled with gratitude for having shared a small portion of their lives. Sandra's mindset is one of compassion, kindness, unconditional love, forgiveness, and a willingness to share yourself. Sandra feels that she is blessed to work with these wonderful people whom she knows are always grateful even when they can't find the words.

She sums up the impact of her volunteering with these words:

"Therapeutic Touch and hospice volunteering has had a monumental, amazing and wonderful impact on my life. I am so blessed to have them both to meet and help my fellow earth passengers, who in turn help me to be a kinder and more compassionate traveler. They have taught me that we have to love one another unconditionally, with loving kindness, acceptance and completely without judgment. I am convinced that's what our journey on earth is all about – love thy neighbour as thyself."

My journey with Therapeutic Touch began in 2004, while I was working full time as a Home Care worker. At that time I was caring for a stroke victim whose wife was told that his caregiver should take a look at this therapy because it would help him and other clients.

I took my first Therapeutic Touch workshop and I was sold! From that day on I began to work on

my levels and in 2010 I received my R.P status.

On opening my own business, called "Hand To Heart", I realized that no one had any idea what Therapeutic Touch was, so how was I ever going to get this off the ground! So I set out on a mission to spread the news.

First I got a practice group going, inviting people to come and receive treatments. This was slow going, starting with two but now we are over thirty every week – not always the same people. In addition, we started a group in a nursing home where staff and residents come weekly. Then I checked in at the community schools in the area. No problem – they are always looking for presenters.

Now the problem was how to give 2 hour sessions for 10 week presentations. So I came up with the idea called "Your Well Being". The focus was on how to be well and stay well in Body, Mind and Spirit. Every session was spent on the golden rules for healthy living, eat well, exercises and lots of sleep/rest. Every session ended with a Therapeutic Touch demo.

It didn't take long until people were calling for treatments, as well as organizations wanting me to come and speak to their group. As a result, the community knows what Therapeutic Touch is all about and my greatest advertisement is word of mouth.

I am now semi-retired from Home Care and I work daily with Therapeutic Touch. Once a client contacts me I set up four appointments – three back to back, followed by one two full days later.

But things happen the way they should . . . right?

We believe that the anonymity of the city, or small town, makes it somewhat easier to establish this kind of business. But we are still slowly getting the message of shifting energy out into the ether.

People are catching on. With working in the hospitals – our Harmony Room in Oncology in Yarmouth, and travelling to Halifax to volunteer in the Sunshine Room for two years – people got the message that there must be something to this.

On our days off we also offer free sessions for the cancer patients who are in oncology.



A Model of a Healing Theory Derived from the Practice of Therapeutic Touch

Over the past six years a group of advanced Therapeutic Touch practitioners have come together in Columbia Falls, MT, the home of Therapeutic Touch co-founder, Dr. Dolores Krieger Ph.D. The purpose for these practitioners, teachers, and researchers gathering together was to develop a Theory of Healing derived from the practice of Therapeutic Touch, through the use of the Dialogue process.

The essence of the Dialogue Process is learning. Through this process, meaning is explored and created. In the first dialogue session in 2010 the group struggled with understanding the use of the dialogue process and how one would work with this process to achieve the desired outcome. As the annual dialogue sessions continued the dialogue process became familiar to the participants and the process moved along under the guidance of Dr. Krieger and Dr. Mary Anne Hanley. Each year Dr. Krieger, Dee as she is fondly referred to by those who know and love her, provided the theme and foundational information for the dialogues. The Therapeutic Touch process was explored from numerous perspectives as the group developed broader understandings of the process and the terminology used to describe what was happening in the Therapeutic Touch process that would inform a broad theory of healing. Terminology that was outside the Therapeutic Touch realm was used as a focus for dialogue and greater understandings were derived through the dialogue process. In 2014, the key constructs were identified and Dr. Hanley diagrammed these constructs in a working model. In preparation for the 2015 dialogues, participants were asked to do Therapeutic Touch sessions and then ask themselves: "Where in the Therapeutic Touch session were these constructs present?" The outcome of these explorations were shared with the dialogue participants and served as an affirmation of the model representing Healing in the Therapeutic Touch process.

What follows is the model as it was shared at the Therapeutic Touch International Association Congress in Seatte, WA in April, 2015. The model (presented below) is a diagrammatic representation of the Theory of Healing that will be developed as the Dialogues continue. This Theory of Healing is comprised of five constructs. Within this Theory of Healing, healing emerges through epiphanal experiences when an individual's wholeness is recognized by another and the individual manifests a change in personal field patterning. Healing is experienced as a shift in consciousness in which healer and healing partner experience reciprocal change or transformation.

Model of a Healing Theory

(Hanley, M. A., et al., 2015)

The Model constructs are defined as follows:

Engaging Presence "An intentional empathic attunement for the purpose of mutual interconnectedness"


Consciousness "An awareness that transcends the dynamic fields used intentionally for the purpose of engaging in a partnership with another to help or heal"

Order "A fundamental principle/law of underlying intelligence foundational to the dynamic interconnected wholeness of the universe"

Patterning "Continual expression of one's unique biodynamic field in relationship with the universal energy field"

Epiphanal Knowing "A sense of spontaneously connecting with the universe in a new way, an expression of change"
